

Current TROPHI funding opportunities

TROPHI funding opportunities available now! Note- You don't need to be a researcher to apply. Eligibility for each grant is outlined below. We encourage, GPs, Practice Managers, GP registrars, other primary health care professionals and medical students to consider applying.

Masters / PhD student bursaries (\$10,000)

The MSc and PhD Bursary is worth \$10,000 for students interested in expanding their formal research qualifications through the department of General Practice at either Monash University and University of Melbourne. Research must be aligned with the needs of the TROPHI region and be conducted in collaboration with one of TROPHI's partner organisations.



Education bursaries (\$1,000)

\$1000 bursaries to support access to education aligned with TROPHI regional needs, or aimed at building capacity for involvement in research, translation or education – aimed at primary care/general practice professionals, including GP registrars and medical students.

Research development bursaries (\$5,000)

For GP registrars and trainees from other primary care disciplines. The bursary can be used for professional development in the areas of research, translation or education, or put towards the costs associated with a research activity.

Seed funding for practice-based research (\$10,000)

Professionals working in primary health care and general practice can apply for seed funding to support you to address your own research questions using practice-based research. If you have a burning research question aligned with a need in our <u>region</u> consider applying now.

TROPHI mentoring program opens second intake

This program is for GPs, general practice staff, and primary health workers in the regions of Knox, Maroondah, and Yarra Ranges. You will build connections with experiences mentor and grow research translation skills.

RACGP Foundation 2025 PhD Top-up Scholarships

The RACGP Foundation is pleased to offer two PhD top-up scholarships to support outstanding GPs and GPs in training to undertake PhD research in 2025.

Benefits include: A \$25,000 per annum stipend plus a \$5,000 annual professional development bursary is available for up to 3.5 years for full-time PhD candidates, or pro-rata for up to 7 years for part-time candidates.

TROPHI seed funding for practice-based research is aimed at professionals working in primary health care and general practice. The aim is to provide funding and support for you to address your own research questions using practice-based research, with a focus on bringing research knowledge into practice.

Congratulations to the inaugural recipients of TROPHI seed funding for practice-based research: Dr Simone McCallum, Dr John Wong, Dr Anita Morris and Dr Shabarish Kamalanathan from Eastern Health (General Practitioners, Eastern Health Psychiatry Department, Murnong Clinic). This team have secured \$10,000 to support their project that seeks to evaluate a model for collaboration between GPs and Psychiatrists which may improve patient care and result in wider benefits.

Join world-first RCT study on Conn Syndrome

A GP-led team is testing whether a tweak to clinical software makes it easier to diagnose Primary Aldosteronism (or Conn's Syndrome). Conn Syndrome causes one in every seven cases of hypertension – once found, it makes hypertension far easier to treat.
